Happy March! I don't know about you but I'm feeling like spring is almost here; however, with the upcoming forecast, I'm feeling like we need to stay focused on weathering through the remaining days of winter.
Speaking of winter, please be reminded that Flu Season is still in effect. We have recently placed signage at our entrances to remind our UMV family to please take precautions to avoid the flu and cold outbreak. We are aware that the Flu is on the rise in our area. We are remaining optimistic for us that we'll be spared. If you aren't personally feeling well, please avoid visiting in common areas or dining in our dining rooms. Please take advantage of meal delivery service and if needed, the mini-market is open for a can of chicken noodle soup, jello or applesauce. If needed, we can deliver mini-market items, too. Remind family and friends to avoid visiting if they aren't feeling well. Handwashing, drinking plenty of fluids and getting quality sleep are the best preventions for all!
Thanks to everyone who attended last months "Ask Anita" gathering. For those of you who missed it, we discussed our beautiful Village landscaping. As you know, our landscaping and grounds efforts are endless 365 days a year. Please be reminded that we are now in our 20+ year mark and the needs are endless. In particular, I shared that we are in the process of developing a 5 year landscaping plan. Rick Taylor and I met with our current vendor and have evaluated outside vendors as well. As I mentioned, Spring is almost here and that means spring clean up including bed, tree and shrubbery plans are a priority. One area that we are responding to is mulching. We are addressing removing some areas that are over supplied with mulch. While we'd like to remove all mulch and start fresh, the manual labor involved is beyond one season. We are identifying our priority areas and planning accordingly. Many of you have provided your personal input on areas that you see as a priority and this includes Mark Belangee's input as well. Yes, we haven't forgotten that the lake is a priority and those plans are already under way. We do value and sincerely appreciate your feedback. Thank you!
I also shared that we are ready for implementation of our One Call Now. Once Call gives the ability to make automated phone calls to either individual residents, groups of residents and or to all residents. We can record or type a message and push a button that will deliver messages directly to your individual phone line. Our plan for now is to deliver important messages such as power outages, response to certain safety issues or very special announcements. We will be conducting a mass text sometime the week of March 4th-8th. Again, the message will be sent to your phone and we will share a message that will indicate that this is a test message from the UMV One Call Now messaging system. By the way, we did test the system with a message to an individual resident and it took approximately 27 seconds for it to be received. We hope that you will find this as a helpful and timely way to enhance our communication with you.
Thanks to everyone for your attendance at our Town Hall Meeting with members of our Board Envision Committee. I wanted to give you an update on our lobby renovation and name modification. Enclosed in this newsletter, you will find a flyer asking for your participation in "Naming the Village." Your thoughts and ideas on our future name modification are welcome. The winning name submitted will receive a special prize. Many of you have

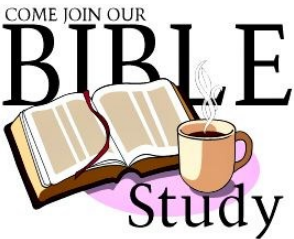

The actual origin of quilting remains unknown but there have been various pieces found throughout history that have allowed us to trace this talent all the way back to the ancient Egyptian First Dynasty (c. 3400 BC). In 1924, a quilted floor cover (I envision to be much like our area rugs of today) was found in Mongolia by archaeologists which was estimated to date between 100 to 200 BC.

In American Colonial times (1400-1800 AD), quilts were predominantly whole-cloth quilts meaning, a single piece of fabric layered with batting and backing held together with fine needlework quilting. Throughout time different techniques and ideas can be found which allow us much of the customs in quilting that we see in today's modern work. These include: appliqué, mixing prints such as a calico with larger scale design, needlepoint and patchwork, just to name a few.

Quilting became a widely popular form of art through the years and these varied depending on country and/ or location. Native American, South African, Amish, American, European, Swedish... Everyone creating their own version of the much loved and appreciated cloth art. It's an amazing and impressive history we have in quilting. It is truly a labor of love that spans every culture and generation.

SCAM ALERT

Godfrey man warns residents of possible phone scam

GODFREY - A Godfrey resident reported to Riverbender.com that he was recently a victim of a phone scam. "I received two \$1,100 iPhones with new accounts, addressed to my name and address, that I never ordered," Steve Aimone said. "I have no account with them. I returned them to the store and had to close out the accounts and issue a fraud alert on my credit report as the scammers used my credit to order them. I saw on Fox 2 this also happened in Columbia. I just wanted others to be aware of what was going on." "I was dumfounded how they got my information," Aimone said. "I had to sign for a small package and I received two Verizon iPhones with new phone numbers on them. I never had an account with Verizon. I checked and someone did a credit inquiry on my credit and got it shipped. I took the two phones to the Verizon store in Edwardsville and they walked me through the process and took the phones back and made sure all the accounts were cancelled. They said they would send something to the Credit Bureau about what had happened."

Aimone's thought is if the phones were delivered and no one was there, whoever was doing the scam could go to someone's doorstep, take the package and sell the phones for cash.

The Godfrey man said he wanted to bring his story to the public to try to alert residents this had happened to him.

The Madison County Sheriff's Office said if someone has this happen to them, immediately contact the company and either mail or return the items and file a fraud report.

EDWARDSVILLE - The Madison County Sheriff's Office said it had fielded several calls on Friday from concerned parents or grandparents advising them their son or daughter was in custody at the Sheriff's Office and they could post bond over the phone. Madison County Sheriff's Office officials stressed that this is a scam phone call.

"There are phone calls being made to various parents advising that their son/daughter is in the Madison County Jail," the sheriff's office said. "The person called is given a couple of phone numbers to post bond over the phone for the person in jail. The Madison County Jail will never take bond money over the phone. If someone calls you asking for money or your credit card number, you need to hang up on them or tell them NO!"
